PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As we prepare for High Holy Days this year, TBE has posed the question "What's Your Why?" Why are you proud to be a Jew or part of a Jewish community? What does it mean to live a Jewish life? All of us have the power of choice, yet we choose to identify and live as Jews. So why are we proud to be Jewish?

The Oxford dictionary defines "pride" as "a feeling or deep pleasure or satisfaction derived from one's own achievements, the achievements of those with whom one is closely associated, or from qualities or possessions that are widely admired." What is it that delights you about being Jewish? Think about it for a moment (or two).

Rabbi Joshua Samuels of Congregation Beth Israel posed similar questions in a recent High Holy Day address and offered why he is proud to be Jewish. I share excerpts from his sermon with you here as it resonated with me—perhaps it will stir something similar in each of you.

As we enter the New Year and reflect on our relationships with our loved ones, our community and with G_d, perhaps we can also reflect on our relationship with our heritage. We can ask ourselves why it is a source of pride and meaning in our daily lives. This is a personal quest and I hope each of you will be able to come up with your own answers.

I am proud to be Jewish because we are taught to "never forget." This can be onerous at times, but it keeps us grounded as we remember our roots and the road we've travelled. We bring the past with us and we call upon it to guide us in the future. Recalling events that shaped us provide Jews everywhere with a shared history and a compassion for others suffering around the globe.

I am proud to be Jewish because of the emphasis Judaism has on learning, on educating our youth and on asking questions. A line from the Shema, our central declaration of faith, is, *V'shinantam l'vanecha* "And you shall teach them (these words) to your children."

I am proud to be Jewish because our tradition places greater emphasis on the present than it does on the future. Rabbi Yochanan ben Zakkai taught: "If you have a sapling in your hand and someone tells you the Messiah has arrived, first plant the sapling and then go out to welcome the Messiah." How we act today can have great consequences in the future. So it is better to focus on completing our tasks now than pray for what may or may not come to be.

I am proud to be Jewish because we are commanded to see every human being, *b'tzelem elohim*, as created in the Divine image. Rich, poor, black, white, trans, queer, straight, handicapped, Christian, Sikh, Hindu, Muslim, young, old, stranger, Republican, Democrat, Libertarian, climate change denier – each person is equal and created with the spark of the Divine, no matter how dim it might seem.

I am proud to be Jewish because our tradition teaches us that Jews-by-choice are dearer to God than Jews-by-birth. Just because you were born into the family does not give you more rights or preferential treatment. A Jew is a Jew is a Jew. Anyone who casts aspersions on the Jewish status of a Jew-by-choice is in violation of one of the most important laws in the Torah: not to oppress the convert.² At the same time, seeking new members is not our goal. Should someone express a desire to join us, we take this commitment seriously and create a lengthy, but meaningful path to honor this journey.

I am proud to be Jewish because the mitzvot provide us a guide to live our lives in the public and private spheres. They give us the tools to make both important and everyday decisions. They remind us that every moment can be sacred, from waking in the morning to seeing a rainbow to enjoying an afternoon snack.

I am proud to be Jewish because Shabbat reminds us to be grateful and to slow down in an ever-rapidly-changing world. Emails and phone calls can wait. The strike of the match and the smell of freshly baked challah are our pause buttons in life. Shabbat truly is a "sanctuary in time."

I am proud to be Jewish because G_d can be found in our sacred texts, in a blade of grass, in a conversation, or in the actions of a stranger. A Jew can have a meaningful Jewish life even if he does not believe that G_d plays any role in it.

I am proud to be Jewish because Judaism teaches simultaneously that we are each unique and special but also no greater than dust and ashes. Humility is a core Jewish value.

I am proud to be Jewish because while the Talmud teaches us *kol yisrael arevim zeh bazeh* ³, "all of Israel are responsible for each other," we are equally responsible to our neighbors and fellow citizens of the world.

As I finished visiting my mother in La Serena, Chile, I began to contemplate the upcoming Yamim Noraim (High Holy Days).

Growing up in my hometown the High Holy Days were a moving and special experience with a sing-along and participatory service. Most everyone knew what to expect and how to take part. The end of Yom Kippur always inspired and uplifted us, both personally and as a community.

How important are the High Holy Days to you? This year and every year? What is your "why"? I'm guessing there are many of us who desire a few days to shut out and subdue an increasingly outrageous storm of life experiences and reconnect again with a simpler purpose, a more uplifting affinity; we want to remember that there are other things in life (outside of our phones, and our businesses, and the chaos) to enjoy and pay attention to. The opportunity to be in shul in the company of family and community facilitates our longing to reconnect with one another, and with God. It is impossible to avoid the reality of this past year or the effects it has on our lives. Reflection. That is my "why".

The unspoken call of the Holy Days in La Serena more than 50 years ago was to renew the sacred within and among our 60 person Jewish Community. In Rochester, at Temple Beth El, the essence of last Rosh Hashanah, and last Yom Kippur, to this year, remains the same, to embrace the healing, restorative nature of these days of awe. But let us remember to take a moment, in this new year, to acknowledge what is different as we are drawn together into our new sanctuary, to make meaning of our shared time. We are being brought before "the court on high" to forgive each other, as well as our lesser selves, and find the way forward toward a greater evolution of spirit.

Do you want to know "why"? Because we need these sacred days to walk through a world that may sometimes seem like a smog laden valley and give ourselves time to come out the other end spiritually and communally uplifted. We must renew ourselves spiritually, keeping our faith and community alive.

May the upcoming Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur observances help us find a spiritual state where we can acknowledge that we have endured, and come away spiritually ready to ascend to new acts of selfless loving kindness and take deliberate and conscious views of our lives. We need this season. For these ten days, at least, let us run no more. May we take this time to make our lives worth living and fill them with Jewish experience and renewed spirit.

NOTES FROM OUR HAZZAN...

I am amazed by the many people who have enriched our lives during the past year at Temple Beth El. Synagogues really are like families, with a complex system of relationships that ebb and flow and, hopefully, flourish into a marvelous ecosystem. The Jewish calendar has an ebb and flow as well. We repeat the various holidays and Torah readings each year with an order and structure, and a certain expectation of familiarity throughout our encounters. There is another expectation, however, that the fruit of our repetitive encounters will somehow yield something new: some new insight or revelation, a fresh approach to a situation, or perhaps a new relationship.

In Judaism, we are encouraged to study Torah "b'chavruta," in partnership. The term chavruta is actually derived from the word for friend, "Chaver." We are thus instructed to encounter the tradition, and also to encounter one another. In our modern world it is easy and tempting to study alone. We can open an Art Scroll Siddur or search the internet and find answers to our questions that seem satisfactory. Our tradition, though, strongly discourages this self-centered approach to learning. Our sages teach that one who sits alone to study Torah becomes stupid! True learning comes from explaining and testing our ideas with other human beings and arriving at new conclusions through a repeated, collaborative effort. This is also true in prayer, where we are encouraged to pray with a minyan. Praying in the Jewish sense means to engage in a uniquely human endeavor: to seek change, and to examine our desires. When we do this as a community, as a family, we can achieve a spiritual state that cannot be experienced in solitude. As we gather together again this year, may we do so with our hearts and minds open to encountering the divine, and each other, in new and wondrous ways.

YOUTH EDUCATION CORNER

L'shana tova v'metuka!

The doors of Limmud open on September 8th when the new school year begins and we welcome back our students and staff. This is one of my favorite days of the year as we welcome back our students and staff. We invite parents to tour our newly renovated Chapel and Sanctuary at 11:30 am and to join us for lunch and a celebration immediately following Limmud at noon. Seeing the smiling faces of your children reminds me of why I am the Director of Limmud Religious School. In this role I have the privilege of partnering with dedicated educators, clergy, and parents to create a

positive, inclusive learning environment and robust curriculum for Jewish youth. Together we are developing the Jewish leaders of tomorrow.

This year's Limmud theme is Tikkun Olam. Limmud staff and students, along with their families, will be given many opportunities to practice individual and collective acts of kindness. Together we will work to improve the world through social action and community service.

We will once again be offering youth services and educational programs for children of all ages during the high holidays. We invite you to join your children in services where you have the opportunity to help them understand the true meaning of Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah. It is our expectation that Limmud students will attend at least 10 services during the school year. We hope that you will engage in prayer and learning with your children throughout the year in Junior Congregation and family programs and services.

There are a number of exciting programs launching this year. We have developed a new B'nai Mitzvah curriculum for grades 5-7th. Both Rabbi Bitran and Hazzan Levin will be teaching in this new program. Over the course of this 3-year curriculum students will prepare for their B'nai Mitzvah by helping lead Friday night and Shabbat morning services; learning Torah and Haftarah trope and the blessings before and after the Torah reading; becoming familiar with their own parsha and preparing a d'var torah based on it; and developing proficiency in reading their parsha and haftarah. We are also launching an innovative new interschool 8th and 9th grade program, "Writing the Next Chapter of Your American Jewish Story". Jacqui Lipschitz, Director of Education, Temple B'rith Kodesh, and I developed this program in partnership with the National Museum of American Jewish History in Philadelphia, PA. This two-year curriculum challenges students to exercise critical thinking and inquiry-based learning skills while exploring the American Jewish experience. All 8th and 9th graders in the Rochester Jewish Community are welcome to enroll.

In October we will be welcoming 4 Israeli Shinshinim to Rochester. These recent high school graduates are deferring their army service for one year to work with students in Rochester. We are fortunate that 2 Shinshinim will be coming to Limmud each Wednesday and every other Sunday. These talented teens will be leading creative, fun and developmentally appropriate educational activities and lessons. The possibilities are numerous as we think about how they will enrich our Hebrew program and Israel curriculum. In addition, the Shinshinim will be participating in family programs throughout the year so look for more details in the coming months.

We are continuing to collaborate with Temple B'rith Kodesh and Temple Sinai to offer engaging experiential learning programs for our students. The first interschool program will take place at Temple B'rith Kodesh on Sunday morning, October 20 when Naomi Less will lead a musical and spiritual Sukkot/Simchat Torah program. It is going to be awesome.

Lastly, mark your calendars for Sunday, September 15th, 7:00 pm for Limmud's Open House. This is an evening to learn about your child(ren's) curriculum and schedule, to meet their madrichim (teachers) and their classmates' parents. We are looking forward to seeing you and your family in the New Year!

EARLY CHILDHOOD UPDATE

L'Shana Tova!

After a wonderful summer at Camp Keshet, our school year is in full bloom! Our children are excited to see their friends after weeks apart, and families are thrilled to welcome new faces with open arms! It is truly a wonderful feeling at Keshet! Once again, we have two two-year old rooms filled with young learners, and Gan Gadol, our pre-k class, is at capacity. We have a fall Pitzels class once again of young learners that we cannot wait to watch grow.

One of the highlights to our programming this year is the addition of the ShinShinim. These Israeli students, who are taking a gap year between high school and the army are working with our Keshet students on Wednesdays during music and during Shabbat sing, Shabbat stations, and our newest enrichment called "Jewish Summer Camp throughout the Year" on Fridays. The ShinShinim are really bringing some new value to our curriculum and understanding of Israel to our youngest students.

We are going to be having a lot of neat programming going on for our youngest congregants during the high holidays. We will once again have services that are developmentally appropriate for children of all ages, as well as have lunch available during Yom Kippur. During Sukkot, there will be some unique programming on both days, as well as the evening and day of Simchat Torah. The programming will be Chag-friendly, and will surely engage and help your children in the understanding of the meaning of the holidays.

As you bring your children to various High Holiday programs, throughout the season, I strongly encourage you to take a moment to think about your why. Why am I bringing my child to a program that teaches about Sukkot? What do I want my child to get out of this? What values do I want my child to learn? How do we want to feel as a family? Why is this important to my family? Don't forget to reflect about your why.

On a personal note, choices I made from the time my son was an infant to now and my why helped shape my family into what it is today. When my son was 9 months old, we brought him to Early Childhood Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services. Beginning at 18 months old, we started reading the book The Hardest Word by Jacqueline Jules every year on Yom Kippur. Discussions began with the importance of "I'm sorry" to eight years later showing self-reflection. Themes from the High Holidays that we brought attention to now carry throughout the whole year. Often times when my son will apologize for his mistakes, he'll remind me that he is taking responsibility and saying the hardest word. This is one example of many how I have found my why through Early Childhood experiences and education with my own family during the High Holidays.

Feel free to stop at any time with questions, comments, concerns or even to share your why with me for your young family.


