FROM THE DESK OF THE SENIOR RABBI

Why Observe Sorrow?

On Tisha B'Av Sunday, July 17th, after Shabbat is over, we will gathered to read the Book of Lamentations (Eicha). On Sunday morning, we shall read and chant "Kinot" or poems of elegy to mark the fast day. The first Temple of King Solomon was destroyed on Tisha B'Av in the year 586 BCE. Subsequently, that Temple was rebuilt when the exiles returned from Babylonia and

destroyed again in the year 70 CE by the Romans. There are those less aware of our traditions who find strange this embrace of sadness. This association with the tragedy of the past, which we mark on Tisha B'Av, cuts deeply into the Jewish consciousness. It finds expression in other practices. For example, breaking the glass at the end of a wedding celebrations in memory of the destruction of the Holy Temple and the exile of the Jewish people.

There are those who oppose these practices and say it is unnatural, this unremitting mourning of Zion. Why do you seek to relive that tragedies of the past, they say? These are best left for historians. Why bother with lamentations and mourning? Time sweeps away all the difficulties and the pain and the adversity. Is not this a kind of pathology? In a healthy mind, the unpleasantness of the past is forgotten. But this destruction of its memory is stubbornly preserved in Jewish forms of observance.

These critics find added force with the re-establishment of the state of Israel. They say, with the state itself, we mark the end of the homelessness of the Jewish people. They argue, all you have to do is to visit Israel. Why fast if the Western Wall of the Holy Temple is again in Jewish hands? Because of moral reasons; because destruction and sadness remembered by Tisha B'Av is of a moral nature. We failed to show honesty and deal correctly with our brothers and sisters. Because it was Jew against Jew; because this was the moral failure of the Jewish People; we must remember what happened. WE need to grasp what it means to be a Jew, because sometimes you learn as much from your failures as you do from your successes.



EARLY CHILDHOOD UPDATE



It's hard to believe that a year ago at this time we hadn't even had registration out. We were just preparing for a few weeks of camp and trying to figure out how we were going to safely open in the Fall. Now we are entering summer with a bang with 7 full weeks of camp that will include lunch bunch and enrichment, and we have finished school together in this memorable year. Registration is out for the Fall, and we are filling up in several of the classes very quickly. This is much different than what our outlook was like last year, when we were taking guesses as to what the Fall would

bring.

The past few months have been nothing short of incredible seeing families coming together for a rainbow-themed program about Lag B'Omer and two early childhood programs for Shavuot. We actually had an in-person Tot Shabbat on June 18. This was only our second one since January of 2020! (The first was early last September). We are slowly moving in the right direction, and there is nothing more exciting than having our children and families all together again.

One of the many highlights of the past few months was our Butterfly Release. Four of our five Keshet classrooms cultivated caterpillars that turned into butterflies. The children loved watching these creatures change and learned vocabulary such as metamorphosis and life cycles. It was neat to see the names the children came up with for their caterpillars, including Fluffy, Rolex, and Pickles! Rabbi Winaker led an in-person program to say some prayers over the mitzvah of releasing the butterflies, and then Zoomed into all of our Keshet classes as they released the rest. The magic happened as the children watched their butterflies fly out of their temporary homes and into the sky. One by one the teachers were calling out the names of the butterflies, and the smiling faces and squeals of the children were contagious.

We celebrated the end of this unprecedented year with a community heroes-themed party. Each class had their own time to shine and to participate in various activities including making their own capes and hero autograph books. We had great Bubble Artist for entertainment and finished the day with Mini-Melts ice cream! It was the perfect send-off for our own young heroes!

We are thrilled to have so many family events planned for this summer, including limited space in Camp Keshet. We began a series of Sunny Sundays at the playground for young families to shmooze and get to know each other. We plan on doing this monthly as long as the weather holds up.

Watermelon Wednesday guests include the City of Rochester Fire Department, Jewish Children's musician Leah Sherman, Hillel Community Day School, PJ Library, Butterfly Kids Yoga, Aerial Arts Acrobatics, and Gail Vail with Amusement Park Art. Expect some guest appearances from Jojo's Cool Bus (a school bus filled with ice cream!). Watermelon Wednesdays run from June 30- August 11 at 1pm.

We will be finishing our summer with a long-awaited musical performance from Shira Kline, also known as Shirlala! On August 22 at 10 am, come grab your favorite spot on our lawn and hear this famous Jewish Children's Artist and her band! This will be a great way to start your Sunday and a nice end of the summer family activity. Be on the lookout for more information! This is something you do not want to miss. REMEMBERING ILANA

ILANA CARYL FINKELSTEIN
DECEMBER 9, 1987-JANUARY 9, 2021

Ilana's life revolved around family, friends, pets and art. Her art began at age seven, when she began to sculpt. She had hands meant for creating – sculptures, ceramics, jewelry, paintings and drawings, crocheting, metalworking, stained glass, lampwork. She needed to keep those hands constantly busy and the objects she created were amazing.

Ilana was a graduate of Brighton New York High School, and attended RIT's School of American Craft. She focused on her art, and was active in the summer craft fair circuit in the Rochester/Buffalo area. Recently she had been living in St. Paul, MN, where she had an art studio.

Ilana was a true artist, with an artist's soul, eye and talent. She was known for her paintings, drawing, and sculpting, and had an enthusiastic following for each. Her first love was jewelry design, which she sold through her small business Needy Ego Designs. She saw the world through an artist's eye, aware of the intrinsic beauty of things. She used her art to touch people and trigger an emotional response in all who experienced it. She cared deeply about the environment, animals, and the struggles people encounter in their lives. In her own way, she tried to make the world a better place.



She was morally outraged by the inequities and evils she saw all around her in the world. If you knew her, you probably own something she made. She was always giving away her precious objects, especially if you admired something in particular. For her, art was not something to sell, but something to experience. She would say "take it" and would not take no for an answer.

INTRODUCING THE ILANA FINKELSTEIN ART FUND

The Ilana Finkelstein Art Fund has been established to support a strong Jewish visual arts presence at Temple Beth El, Rochester, New York, and in the Rochester Jewish community at large. Jewish visual arts inspire us to perceive our world in wonderfully varied ways. Temple Beth El is a strong Conservative congregation which strives to fulfill the 3 pillars of a synagogue—a house of worship, a house of study, and a house of assembly for the Jewish people. Jewish visual arts can help us forge connections to all three pillars.

Visual arts vary in form, content and structure, from ancient forms such as painting and drawing, to modern forms such as sculpture and photography. The Ilana Finkelstein Art Fund strives to use a variety of these forms to impact our emotions as well as our intellect, in support of our members and their connection to the values of Conservative Judaism.

In its formative years, the Fund is envisioned to support an annual temple-wide event. Initial ideas include (1) an artist-in-residence weekend, with teaching components for youth and adults, (2) an art show and sale, or perhaps (3) an artists salon, where local emerging and established artists share their completed pieces or works-in-progress with other artists and the Temple community. In future years, the Fund can flexibly evolve to meet the needs and opportunities of the Temple community.

The Ilana Finkelstein Art Fund hopes to share Ilana's love of art and Judaism with her Temple community.
