PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



It is said that we can become spiritually ill if we are not studying Torah on a regular basis. We read Torah at the synagogue three days each week. Around the world, Jews study the same words together as we have done for thousands of years, trying to understand and apply the lessons provided to us. We gain inspiration and instruction, that we all apply in different ways to the struggle that we call life.

For many of us, the notion that we might take on the challenge of learning a Torah portion to be chanted in the synagogue is really just one reserved to a celebration of a 13th birthday. I have had the experience of learning a Torah portion outside of my Bar Mitzvah celebration, and found it to be very meaningful.

There's something very powerful about being engaged with a small piece of the text in a very intimate way. While my voice was surely not more pleasant to listen to, the experience as an adult was much richer in many ways as compared to my approach as an early teen.

I know that Rabbi Bitran has spoken eloquently about the value of having synagogue community members take up the learning and chanting of portions for Shabbat services. The Synagogue has resources for helping those of us who really don't know where to start. There are individuals in our community who are happy to teach the trope and the melodies related to chanting a Torah portion. There are resources for learning about the context of the portion itself. And there are people who are eager to share their experience.

I am embarking on learning my third Torah portion of my life. I hope to make it a tradition to keep these portions fresh in my mind, so that I can chant them on a regular annual basis into the future. It is my hope that there are others in our synagogue community that might find this experience meaningful and engage with Rabbi, Debbie and future clergy in this meaningful way. This is one way that many of us can fend off spiritual illness and engage directly with the words of our faith.

TO SELL YOUR HAMETZ

The Torah prohibits the ownership of hametz (flour, food or drink made from the prohibited species of leavened grain: wheat, oats, barley, rye or spelt) during Passover. Ideally, we burn or remove all hametz from our premises which may be done through donations to a local food pantry. In some cases, however, this would cause prohibitive financial loss. In such cases, we arrange for the sale of the hametz to a non-Jew and its repurchase after Passover. You can arrange for this sale of your Hametz by sending the following form to Rabbi Bitran at the Temple office *no later than Tuesday, April 4th.*

It is customary to include a donation to provide *Maot Hittin* funds for Passover supplies for the needy. Please make checks payable to Temple Beth El which will be contributed to *Maot Hittin* on everyone's behalf.

FROM THE DESK OF THE SENIOR RABBI

A charming story is told about a Passover Seder. The youngster has just asked the question which Jewish children have asked since time immemorial. "Why on this night do we eat Matzah? The parent answered as parents have answered through countless generations, telling the ancient story of the Exodus from Egypt and the lack of time needed for the bread to rise.

But the youngster still looked puzzled. "What's the matter?" asked the mother, "I don't understand something." The child began, "if they didn't have time to let the bread rise, how did they have the time to make chicken soup and matzo balls?"

That's the beauty of this family holiday of Pesach, we always find questions. Indeed, the Haggadah is the elaboration of an answer to a series of questions asked by the child.

The story is told about Professor Isaac Rabi, one of the great physicists of the last century, a Nobel Prize winner who is interviewed by a reporter and asked "To what do you attribute your success?" Rabi replied, "I owe it all to my mother." The physicist said that whenever he came home from school, his mother said to him, "what good questions did you ask today?" As a consequence of this approach to the child, he developed into one of the great scientists of our age, having mastered the art of asking the right questions.

This art lies at the heart of the Jewish Tradition.

What is the Talmud? We define it as a vast literature composed by the rabbis, or we refer to it as the historic legal tradition of Judaism. To be more accurate, it is a dialogue between scholars who lived in different times, in which questions are raised, not always finding an answer.

This process of asking questions was maintained in the academies of Palestine and Babylonia for a period of over six hundred years with each question generating an answer and each answer generating a question, so that the written record of this dialectic conveys the laws, values and concepts of Judaism shaped by inquiry and response.

When we turn to the Haggadah itself, and we read the passage describing the four children, we note that the wise child is first, but the "wicked child", who irritates and annoys us, is not last, but second. The Hagaddah suggests that our greatest concern is not with the wicked child, because he/she is still part of the dialogue. We can communicate, argue and demonstrate with him/her. But the last child, who does not know how to ask, is our most serious challenge. Is it that he/she does not know enough, or that he/she does not care enough to ask any question? Because of his/her silence, we do not know whether he/she affirms or rejects, whether he/she is loyal or rebellious. We must include him/her by teaching him/her how to ask.

Our concern is properly placed. For each of us should ask those questions which arise out of our identity and commitment. What does Judaism mean to me? What message does it convey? We make our Heritage relevant as we address to it our needs and inquiries.

The most important institution of Jewish life is the Jewish home, for this is the center of Jewish education, inspiration and faith. Passover is uniquely a family festival when grandparents, parents, children and relatives reenact ancient rituals. The whole text of the Haggadah is intended to build a pathway to a child's heart. Passover awakens this question: How do we communicate our heritage to our young, how do we share with them the values so precious to us, how do we fortify and revitalize the Jewish family?

As the Haggadah declares: "Even were we all wise, all learned in the Torah, it is still our duty to tell the story, to ask the questions, for the more one seeks the answers, the more is he/she to be praised."

YOUTH & FAMILY UPDATE

This summer when the Keshet teachers met for professional development, we set a theme of growth mindset. This theme was not only set out to infiltrate Keshet, but also BE WISE and programming. The idea is to not only make it for our students, but also the ones leading our children in education and programming. Throughout the past months as Director my goals have been to keep this growth mindset going strong.

To keep in line with this theme, Keshet received a very generous grant from the Gordon Family Foundation for a Promethean Smart Board that will also be used in BE WISE. The idea is to bring our educational and enrichment activities to the next level of being hands-on and experiential. Teachers are in the process of being trained on its usage and implementation to bring our programs to the next level.

Keshet teachers also had a very meaningful day of professional development where the focus was on improving the way we assess students, and then what to do with those results. Each child develops at such a different pace and the idea is to use our program to reach all students. Early Childhood assessment tools and methods are evolving, and we are keeping up with the times.

We have been looking to grow our teen engagement by collaborating with the other synagogues on various events. In February, we had a collaborative event where our teens did Havdalah and then went snow-tubing. We will follow the same format on March 11, with our teens will be invited to Havdalah and Lasertron at the Lasertron facility in Henrietta. We are planning a big teen takeover of the JCC on May 20. Stay tuned for more details. We have learned from our teens how much they want to be involved in the Jewish community with other Jewish teens, and we are working together to make this happen for them!

BE WISE is continuing to grow, as we have added more sections of classes, more tutors, and more students. Each minimester, we are able to add more offerings for students at different times. This minimester, we had a premier of our theater class, where students look at the foundations of theater from a Jewish lens and learn performance skills. We are bridging our Kehila time and welcoming more special guests, including Rabbi Cantor Penny Meyers, Israeli dancing with Amit, and a look at Jewish Rochester. We had several families attend an in-person extension of the BE WISE day for a Tu B'Shevat Seder, and we had a falafel making demonstration for Dugo Day. We have also learned how much your kids love being involved in Shabbat services. Our third and fourth graders participated in another successful BE WISE showcase and our sixth and seventh graders led a Friday night service. We are looking forward to giving our third, fourth and fifth graders their Siddur the last weekend in April.

I am personally working on a professional development program through the Mandel Teacher Education Institute. The program, which I am now halfway through, consists of six intensive sessions in Chicago, with the end result being a certification in leading professional development among Jewish educators. The philosophies of the program involve enriching Judaic text studies, learning rooted in collaborative inquiry, teachers learn and learners teach, and moral meaning in the work that we do. Every professional development we do now and in the future will follow these principles. My hope is that this program will inspire our own educators in ways they never thought possible.

I look forward to learning with you and finding more ways to support your family. Please do not hesitate to reach out at any time.

EREV PESAH SIYUM

The sunrise to sunset ta'anit (fast) bekhorim (of the firstborn), which occurs on the day

before Passover, is the only fast that applies to just a segment of the community: all males who are the firstborn children in their families (if the firstborn child is female, the first son born after her is not obligated).

There is a widely practiced exemption: On the principle that fasting is prohibited on a joyous occasion, Judaism allows for anyone who attends a religious feast to forego fasting. It is customary to hold a celebratory meal on the completion of study of a tractate of rabbinic literature, called a *siyyum* (conclusion). So the sages initiated the practice of studying the end of a tractate after morning services on Erev Pesah followed by a celebratory meal.

At 7:00 am Wednesday April 5th, the firstborn in each family is invited to the Siyum B'khorim. Following the meal, there is an opportunity to burn your family's remaining hametz in a bonfire in the TBE Garden.

IS IT KOSHER FOR PASSOVER?

Passover has its own special rules of kashrut. On Pesah, Jews are forbidden from owning or consuming hametz (flour, food or drink made from the prohibited species of leavened grain: wheat, oats, barley, rye or spelt).

Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods (kitniyot) to the above list: rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans and peas; however, string beans are permitted). The Committee on Jewish Law and Standards has ruled unanimously that peanuts and peanut oil are permissible. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above kitniyot.

PERMITTED FOODS:

A. The following foods require no kosher l'Pesah label when purchased before or during Passover: fresh fruits and eggs, fresh fish (whole or gutted), fresh or frozen kosher meat other than chopped meat, whole (unground) spices and nuts, including whole or half pecans (not pieces), pure black, green, or white tea leaves or teabags, Nestea regular and decaffeinated unflavored tea, coffee (unflavored regular), baking soda and bicarbonate of soda.

B. The following items may be purchased before Pesah without a Pesah hekhsher but if bought during Pesah require a kosher l'Pesah label: white milk, 100% pure fruit juice, filleted fish, frozen fruit (with no additives), pure white sugar (with no additive), olive oil (extra virgin only), non-iodized salt, quinoa (with no additional ingredients).

C. The following products require reliable ("kosher l"pesah") certification (regular rabbinic supervision is not sufficient), whether purchased before or during Pesah: all baked goods (matzah, Pesah cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzfel meal, and any other products containing matzoh), herbal teas, canned tuna, wine, vinegar, liquor, decaffeinated coffee and tea, dried fruits, oils, frozen uncooked vegetables and all frozen processed foods, candy, chocolate-flavored milk, ice-cream, yogurt, cheeses, butter, and soda. Any processed food bought during Pesah must have a ("kosher l"Pesah") certification.

D. Any detergents, cleaners, etc. which are not a foodstuff and which are not eaten, may be used for Pesah and do not require a special label. These items include: isopropyl alcohol, aluminum products, ammonia, coffee filters, baby oil,

powder and ointment, bleach, charcoal, candles, contact paper, plastic cutlery, laundry and dish detergent, fabric softener, oven cleaner, paper bags, plates, wax paper, plastic wrap, polish, sanitizers, scouring pads, stain remover, and bottled water with no additives.

E. Medicines: Prescription medicines are permitted. Non-prescription pills and capsules are permitted, for liquid medications, check with your rabbi.

BEDIKAT HAMETZ

One of the required holiday ceremonies is Bedikat Hametz, searching for leaven. On the night before the first seder, Tuesday, April 4, we conduct a candle-lit search through our home to ensure that no hametz is still present. It is a brief ceremony in which the entire family can and should participate.

- 1. Make sure that all hametz has been removed or locked away with the exception of what will be needed for the morning.
- 2. Carefully hide some crumbs of bread. This is to insure that the blessing and the ceremony will not be performed in vain.
- 3. Take a candle, a feather or brush, and a box or cloth for the crumbs, and recite this blessing:

 Baruch Ata Adonai, Eloheynu Melekh haolam asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu al biur hametz.

 Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Ruler of the Universe, who has sanctified us with the commandments and commanded us to remove all leaven.
- 4. Perform the search and gather up all the crumbs. Tie them in a bundle which will be burned the next morning. Feel free to (safely) burn it on your own, or use the bonfire at Temple Beth El following morning minyan.
- 5. Recite the following: All manner of leaven which is in my possession, that I have not seen or removed shall be annulled and void of any ownership and considered as the dust of the earth. (The Aramaic for this can be found in the front of your Haggadah.).
- 6. On Wednesday, April 5 at or before 12:00 pm, burn the leaven and recite the formula below:
 All manner of leaven which is in my possession, that I have seen or not seen, that I have removed or not removed, that I have destroyed or not destroyed shall be annulled and void of my ownership and considered as the dust of the earth.
 (The Aramaic for this can be found in the front of your Haggadah.)

PREPARING AN ERUV TAVSHILIN

When Yom Tov falls on a weekday, cooking is permitted, but only to prepare food for that particular day. On Shabbat all cooking is forbidden. Therefore, preparing food for a Shabbat that follows a Friday Yom Tov:

On Wednesday before Yom Tov, prepare the ritual of *Eruv Tavshilin*, the combining eruv, of the cooking for Yom Tov and Shabbat. Start the Shabbat cooking Wednesday April 5 in the afternoon, following this procedure:

- 1. Before the holiday begins, take two prepared foods (customarily matzah) and a cooked food (hard boiled egg or cooked chicken/fish)
- 2. Recite the Prayer
 Baruch Ata Adonai, Eloheynu Melekh haolam asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu al mitzvat eruv.
- 3. Recite declaration that cooking for Shabbat was begun before— and will be completed on Yom Tov "By means of this combining, we are permitted to bake, cook, warm, kindle lights, and make all the necessary preparations for Shabbat during the festival, we and all who live in this city/locale."
- 4. Set aside the two foods for eating on Shabbat during the day. The cooking for Shabbat may now be completed on Yom Tov.

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

Men's Club of Temple Beth El Involving Jewish Men in Jewish Life

A Men's Club Minute: from Club President Howard Ressel

What exactly is a Men's Club—and is it relevant in the 2020s?

When I was growing up in the 60's, my synagogue, Temple Beth Am, had a vibrant Sisterhood. I remember the members cooked in the kitchen and made kiddish treats, did cute shows and wrote strange Jewish lyrics to modern songs. I believe there was a Men's Club but it wasn't as visible. The men lead services, served on the board, and "took care of things" at our small shul. Egalitarian as Temple Beth Am might have been then, traditional roles for men and women were still present. I imagine that was also true for TBE's Sisterhood and Men's Club.

Things have certainly changed, I'd say for the better. Roles have evolved and blended. But we still have separate clubs for women and men. Do we need or want them? Do younger folks ignore them because they think they don't reflect today's attitudes? Or are there programs specifically for men, such as FJMC's "Hearing Men's Voices," that remain important and valuable?

I don't have the answers to these questions, but I know we must find them. Our motto is "Involving Jewish Men in Jewish Life." We need to do this for today's world. That means creating events that will appeal to the entire TBE community, including younger men, their significant others, and their families. We already try to do this when we select speakers for our programs. For example, see the information below about the program on April 16. **And we invite you to join us on Sunday, March 26 to help Kasher the Kitchen for Passover.** The annual clean up job provides a major service to TBE – and a chance for some schmoozing and fun. 


