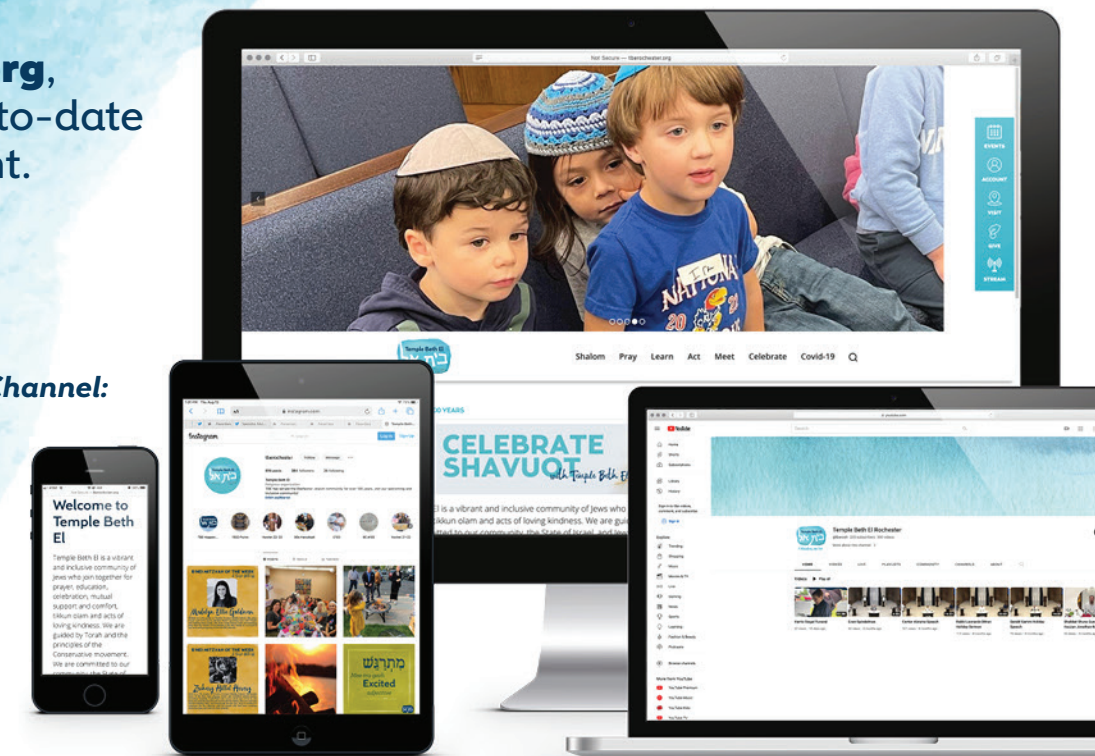

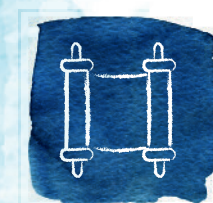

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The approach of a new year is a good time to reflect on the past year, as well as look ahead to to the coming year.

At Temple Beth El, we have focused this year on finding new ways to better connect with you, to help you engage with the many programs, activities and experiences we offer. We did that because in the survey and focus groups we conducted as part of our 2023 Strategic Plan, that was what congregants told us they most wanted from the leadership and clergy of Temple Beth El. We started by hosting a series of very well-attended congregational meetings at which I offered an update and took questions. We’re hoping we can hold such meetings again this year. You’ll be hearing much more about the strategic plan in the coming months, but let me hit a few highlights.

This year, we welcomed both Temple Beth David and Temple Beth Am to share space in our building. From the start, we have actively collaborated with these two synagogues to create a vibrant and multi-faceted approach to religious services and programs. We have worshiped together, attended events together, and we look forward to having members of those congregations join us at some of our holiday services. And we look forward to more opportunities and collaborations, as we work to become a center for Rochester’s Conservative Jewish community.

Helping us achieve that goal, and many others, we are incredibly fortunate to have been awarded a \$1 million grant, paid over 3 years, from the The Max & Marian Farash Foundation. This extremely generous grant will be used in a variety of ways, such as ensuring that we have the clergy and staff needed to provide the level of service our congregation is entitled to expect. Included in that we will be offering innovative and meaningful programming and services, attracting new members while more actively engaging existing congregants, and looking for even more ways to collaborate with other synagogues and organizations across Greater Rochester and beyond.

We are deeply appreciative of the faith that The Max and Marian Farash Foundation has shown in our synagogue by awarding us what will be a game-changing grant.

To further protect our financial future, Temple Beth El plans to embark on an Endowment Campaign. Stay tuned for details on this and many other future plans.

I look forward to working with my fellow officers, including new officer Lisa Tellem and new board members Valerie Ciufu, Ellen Konar and Rachel Musiker. And I thank those whose terms have ended, including officer Alison Fogel, Leslie Crane and Leah Goldman.

FROM THE DESK OF THE SENIOR RABBI

Memories, Youth and a Bigger Tent at Temple Beth El

I have unforgettable memories of my hometown and its 50 Jewish souls praying together in a small room filled with pictures of my ancestors hanging on the walls. I remember my elders leading services. I was very proud of my dad, of blessed memory, and his Tekiot Shofar using his old black straight Turkish Shofar. I was in awe listening to his reading of Maftir Jonah and how that honor was given to him year after year until the last Yom Kippur of his life. But not everything was led by the elders of my congregation, there was a deliberate effort to integrate youngsters to participate in the service. We were asked to read, partake, sing and learn the Sephardic melodies of those beautiful “pizmonim” (traditional liturgical songs praising God) that have now been taken out of the Mahzor. We even had a youth competition to see who would last fasting the entire day. That deliberate effort to integrate youth into the High Holy Day service is something I grew up admiring and wondering if that was a local tradition or something that happened in other communities around the Jewish world; something invented or something that originated in history.

To my surprise, I was able to dig out a beautiful parable from the Dubno Maggid that illuminated my inquiry.

“Dubno Maggid spoke to the youngsters of his community, charging them to do their part in the High Holy Day service. He told them: ‘A man, accompanied by his young son, once traveled on a long journey. Whenever they came to a difficult spot, the man raised the boy onto his shoulders and carried him over the difficult terrain. One day they arrived at a city encircled by a wall. The gates were locked. It was the evening and they were exhausted. Noting some small windows on one side of the walls, the father turned to his son and said: My son, until now I have been kind to you, caring for you. Now I have no recourse but to ask you to be kind enough to climb the walls and enter the city through that little window. Turning to the youngsters, the Maggid said: Dear children, most of the burdens of life are upon the shoulders of your elders. We have the responsibility to clothe and feed you. Not so on this awesome day of *teshuvah* (repentance) because we are afraid the gates of Heaven will be locked and our prayers will not be able to enter the gates. But you, who are pure of transgression, your prayers, said in earnestness from the depths of your hearts, will enter through the little portals until they reach God’s throne. In this way, perhaps you will also be able to come before the Heavenly throne.”

Youth at Temple Beth El will enable us to create new memories and attract young clergy. With their precious voices reading Torah as in years past they will climb the heavens to bring our supplications on the holiest day of the year.

Let us all have more and more young members at Selichot, Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur and even Sukkot to augment our understanding of what it means to start a New Year with a renovated spirit, where everybody is included and where each one of us helps make our tent bigger and open to Temple Beth David, Temple Beth Am, BHBI and you!

From my family to yours—Silvana, Ethan and Lara join me in wishing you a Happy New Year.

FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

This issue of the Kol also demonstrates a change. We will now be printing and mailing the Kol twice a year—one issue with all the information you need to plan for the High Holy Days and a second arriving in late winter with information about Purim, Passover and spring/summer events. Both issues will also be available digitally on our website (www.tberochester.org).

We will continue sending out emails with information about Yahrzeits and will also include monthly Yahrzeit lists on our website. Donations will continue to be acknowledged with an email and thank you letter and also will now be posted to our website monthly.

Condolence notices will continue to be sent out immediately when we are notified.

We know many of you enjoy receiving a regular printed bulletin in the mail. But the reality is that the production time required to create a quality product makes it challenging to provide timely, accurate information.

Which brings me to my last point: **While it’s very important that we communicate with you, it’s equally important that you communicate with us.** We want to know how we’re doing, how you want to engage with your synagogue, what Temple Beth El can do to make your experience here enriching and fulfilling.

Here’s to a new year and a new spirit of two-way communication.

Kaddish is also recited at Ma'ariv (evening service) on the night on which the yahrzeit begins and at Shacharit (morning service) and mincha (afternoon service) on the day of the yahrzeit.
